With those who attempt to commit crimes based on movies and myths in mind, McCoy shares a message of caution and concern.



Pumpkin Spice Cupcakes

Ingredients

2¹/₄ cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon ¹/₂ teaspoon ground nutmeg ¹/₂ teaspoon ground cloves ¹/₂ teaspoon ground allspice 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon baking powder ¹/₂ teaspoon baking soda 1 cup butter softened 1 cup white sugar 2 eggs

- ³/₄ cup milk
- 1 cup pumpkin puree

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Grease 24 muffin cups. Sift together the flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, allspice, salt, baking powder, and baking soda; set aside.

2. Beat ¹/₂ cup butter and white sugar with an elective mixture in a large bowl until light and fluffy. Add the room temperature eggs one at a time allowing each egg to blend into the butter mixture before adding the next. Stir in the milk and pumpkin puree after the last egg. Stir in the flour mixture mixing until just incorporated. Pour the batter into the muffin tins.

3. Bake in the preheated oven until golden and the tops spring back when lightly pressed, about 26 minutes.

4. Spread the choice of frosting on top of all of the cupcakes, and spring a little cinnamon on top.

Last year they faltered in a first round playoff battle, but now the Tampa Bay Lightning start the season bolted up for a new challenge. The Lightning retooled their roster, regained supreme players, and feel poised to compete with the teams at the top.

The Lightning changed their stadium name this offseason from the Tampa Bay Times Forum to Amalie Arena. The reason for the change involved the higher amount of cash offered by the Amalie Oil Co. The Lightning fans persist that they do not like the new stadium name.

"They should have left it as The Forum; it just doesn't feel like it fits the Lightning," Rvan Penland ('16) said.

On the ice, fans expect goaltender Ben Bishop to play elite championship caliber hockey.

"I feel Bishop is a top five goalie. Even after his offseason surgery on his hand, he still looks the same if not better." Penland said.

Dylan Roosa ('17) agrees, but took Penland's opinion to another level.

"I think he is a top three goalie. He was in the final voting for best goalie in the NHL last year," Roosa said.

The Lightning made numerous moves in the offseason to deliver a Stanley Cup contender. General Manager Steve Yzerman focused on strengthening the blue line and the defense in front of Bishop.

"The most crucial additions to the Lightning are the defensive acquisitions of Jason Garrison and Anton Stralman. They are going to bring the veteran talent to the defense that they've needed," Penland

said.

Last year's first round selection Jonathan Drouin supplies a ton of buzz to the Bolts' offense. Last year, Drouin developed his game in the junior league where players clean up deficiencies in their game to prepare for NHL athletes.

"I expect Drouin to be an offensive playmaker and a good scorer," Penland said.

Fans also expect certain players to enhance their game by avoiding mistakes and strengthening their performance.

"Radko Gudas needs to take his game to the next level, and he had way too many costly penalties," Penland said.

Predicting teams that look to give the Lightning fits in the upcoming season, fans arrived at a consensus of one team that posed the biggest threat. "I feel like the Bruins are

going to give the Lightning the most trouble due to their defense," Penland said.


Lightning fans feel optimistic for ascension in the team's play this season.

"They can make it to the second round this year because of playmakers like Steven

Stamkos," Roosa said. Penland showed an even

bigger confidence in the team. "If everything goes planned they can make a solid run and get to the conference finals. or even the [Stanley] Cup," said Penland.

The Lightning organization afflicted a ton of change, from the name of the stadium to the team on the ice, but their chances for a championship team remain a mystery.







Pumpkin Spice Lattes undoubtedly became the biggest hype in fall once again. However, this ongoing trend may come to a halt this fall season. Be prepared for quite possibly the scariest thing of this Halloween season - the ingredients of a Pumpkin Spice Latte.

For years, Starbucks kept the recipe a secret and now, with the big reveal of the ingredients, the world found out why. Starbucks agreed that drinking and eating there every day evokes an unhealthy lifestyle; however no one thought they might cause cancer. According to the experts at FoodBabe, the drink contains monsanto, milk cows fed GMO corn, soy, and cottonseed, or soy milk that contains carrageenan stabilizer linked with intestinal inflammation and cancer. Monsanto companies make a profit off feeding animals unhealthily for the purpose of selling antibiotics to the consumers.

The drink also serves pre-

servatives and sulfites that cause allergic reactions, with a toxic dose of sugar; a Grande contains 49 grams. They also carry ambiguous natural flavors, formed by anything found on Earth. Pumpkin Spice Lattes contain possible pesticide residue from using non-organic coffee beans. The drink contains condensed and conventional milk. Due to consumer pressure, they stopped using milk from cows injected with growth hormones several years ago. However, the milk that they use comes from cows that feed on genetically modified food all day long, which supports monsanto and the biotech companies, who continue to profit of the cow's and consumer's unhealthiness. Starbucks refuses switching the milk they use with organic milk, or any other healthier option.




park with its own exclusive song and can be heard in the background in the form of whistling, humming, or singing, adding an eerie feel to the already ominous house.
